<ul> <li>Check with the college you are applying to and find out about specific testing requirements and whether SAT II Subject tests are required.</li> <li>Use collegeboard.com/quickstart or careercruising.com to explore careers and colleges</li> <li>Attend Financial Aid Night @ Westfield Academy</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Identify 5-8 schools that interest you the most</li> <li>Begin thinking about which colleges you want to visit.</li> <li>Register and study for the upcoming ACT's or SAT's.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Stay open to all the possibilities - don't limit your search.</li> <li>Apply to colleges of varying selectivity as well as public, private, in-state, or out of state, so you have plenty of options to choose from. (Think Targets, Reaches, and a safety net school.)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Contact your counselor if you are considering military academies or ROTC scholarships. If you want either of these you should begin the application process the summer before your senior year.</li> <li>Make sure you have taken the SAT or ACT by end of Junior year</li> </ul>

<ul> <li>Review your goals – what do you need to accomplish? Grades, community service, work experience</li> <li>Begin scheduling visits to 3 to 5 colleges on your final list. If appropriate, apply for an interview.</li> <li>Begin preparing essays for college admissions and scholarship applications.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Look at some college apps – see what information you will need to compile</li> <li>Make a list of teachers, counselors and employers whom you may ask for letters of recommendations for your college applications.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Continue investigating colleges</li> <li>Work on your essay for applications before returning to school.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Plan summer visits to colleges you are interested in attending.</li> <li>Begin working on college applications. Generally, colleges have their applications online by August.</li> </ul>
