A Message From Superintendent Dr. Joshua Liddell

Gratefulness & Growth

As we close out the 2021-22 school year, we have a moment to reflect and be thankful for all the amazing work our faculty, staff, school leaders, parents, and community put forth to ensure our students had a safe and dynamic educational experience. It has been an extraordinary year that required all of us to work together with a common goal of taking care of our students and one another. We are proud to report because of everyone's hard work our school culture has been incredibly positive and constructive as we continue to raise the bar and improve our district.

The end of the school year was highlighted by an amazing commencement ceremony honoring the Class of 2022. Our seniors were blessed with a beautiful graduation evening to parade down Main Street and underneath a huge American Flag surrounded by friends, family, and community members. The graduation ceremony had all the traditional pomp and circumstance including long-standing traditions such as our peonies flower chain, individualized senior recognition statements, and fantastic salutatorian and valedictorian speeches.

During their time at Chautauqua Lake, specifically the last couple of years, our seniors have been flexible, resilient, and strong. They successfully persevered through a host of unique challenges and consistently exhibited leadership qualities and positive character traits they can use as they transition to college or career. The Class of 2022 leaves our district with a well-rounded instructional foundation, life skills, and a great work ethic that they will be able to utilize when they navigate their next steps.

As our seniors take their next steps, so does our district as our building and grounds will go through a transformation this summer. We are proud and excited to share the progress of our Capital Project. Just some of the highlights and new areas that will be part of our students' learning environment and overall experience this coming fall are:

- A Manufacturing & STEM Lab addition that gives us an additional 1200+ square feet of instructional space. The addition includes a technologically advanced industrial classroom with all new woodworking, STEM, and metal working equipment.
- A renovated wrestling/multipurpose suite that adds 700 square feet to our wrestling area, a coaches' office, and a parent waiting/student workout space.
- A new cafeteria that has a collegiate/university feel and an expanded footprint that includes a multipurpose instructional space. The cafeteria will have all new cooking equipment and modern seating.
- A new turf field for our athletic stadium will be host to games and meets for our football, track & field, soccer, and area youth teams. It will be used for softball and baseball practices so our athletes can get outside to practice early in the spring. Our gym classes, the Chautauqua Lake Child Care Center, and Chautauqua Lake BOCES will be able to use the field late into the fall and throughout the spring months to increase student time outdoors.
- A reconstructed playground that has a safety rubber foundation, all brand new equipment, and a walking track. It also will include a small lined field for soccer and football for our kids to use during recess.
- There will be a new tennis complex, new lighting in the auditorium, and a host of other upgrades throughout our school buildings.

In addition to the Capital Project elements, we will be working on building a new trail system this summer that will be located on 40 acres behind the school. The trail system will be used by our students for hiking, mountain biking, snowshoeing, and cross-country skiing. The district is starting a new Adventure Club and purchasing equipment so our students can use the new trails.

We can look back upon the past school year with gratefulness and appreciation for what we have accomplished. The future of Chautauqua Lake is bright and we will continue to work together to enhance student programming and our overall educational environment. Thank you again to everyone for supporting our Class of 2022, the Capital Project and our students!

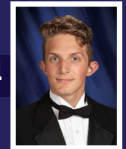

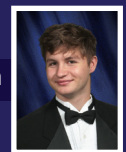

No Pesticides Requiring Advance Notification Used

Chautauqua Lake Central School District practices Integrated Pest Management (IPM) as an effective and environmentally sensitive approach to pest management. IPM utilizes common sense practices to control pests by taking advantage of various pest management options, including the judicious use of pesticides.

As part of its Integrated Pest Management program, the district may periodically use pesticide products requiring notification under State Education Law Section 409-h.

This law requires that all employees and persons in parental relations to CLCS students be offered an opportunity to be informed of pesticide use and be sent summaries periodically throughout the school year.

As this newsletter was sent to press, no pesticides requiring such notification had been used during the 2021-22 school year. If you have questions about the IPM Program or pesticide use at Chautauqua Lake Central School, please contact the Director of Facilities at (716) 753-5825.

Elementary students raised just over \$8,600 dollars in three short weeks. Because of their hard work we were able to raise more than 10 times our original goal!"

In addition to raising monetary donations, 26 students completed Finn's Mission and in the process learned Hands-only CPR and the warning signs of a stroke. The elementary production crew also created special features for the morning announcements to promote healthy habits and physical activity among students and their families. Elementary Principal, Megan Lundgren states "This experience allowed our students to feel empowered and also learn a great deal about other children who may be struggling with unique heart conditions and ways that they can keep themselves and family members healthy." 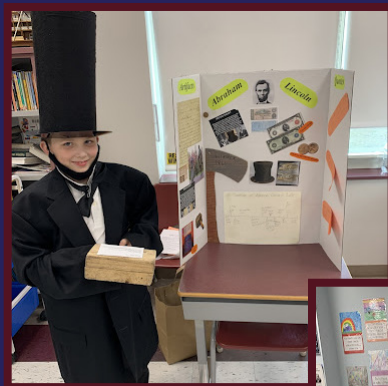

Titles ranged from Factory Eggs Cracked to Have No Fear, Water Power is Here, encompassing 48 projects in 7 areas of science. Projects are judged by a group of high school physics students using specific criteria. This year's winners are pictured right. Isabelle Dawson, Grand Prize Winner for her project, "Nuclear Fusion" stated, "The Science Fair was a very enjoyable experience. I enjoyed getting to show the idea I created."

In addition, 4th-grade students created a Wax Museum in which they dressed up as a historical figure that they researched. Students completed a biography project on an influential person from history and were essentially "frozen in time"; students changed their hair and clothing, memorized a short speech, and brought props to show the accomplishments of that individual. Visitors learned about individuals such as Rosa Parks, Galileo, Lucille Ball, King Tut, Anne Frank, Alexander Graham Bell, Barack Obama, Sacagawea, Walt Disney, Abraham Lincoln, Marie Curie, and more. "I am so proud of the hard work, creativity, and determination that every 4th grader put into their research and biography presentation. Students and staff are already looking forward to hosting this event in 2023!



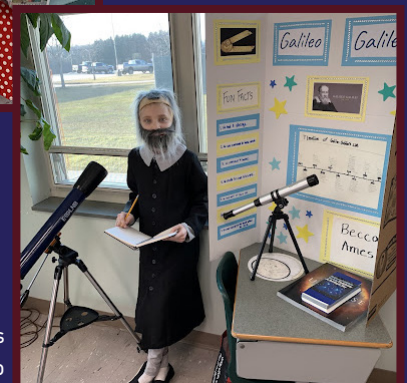

Please ask your health care provider to fax your child's immunization record to the Health Office at (716) 753-2085. School nurses may not request these records from the doctor's office; the parent must initiate the request.

Notification letters were sent in June to parents of children not in compliance with the immunization requirements.

Immunization requirements for school attendance include:

- **MMR/Varicella vaccines:** Two doses of each are required for kindergarten students to attend school.
- **Meningococcal vaccine:** All students entering grades 7 and 12 must have the meningococcal vaccine to attend school.
- **Tdap vaccine:** Students entering grade 6 must receive the Tdap vaccine in order to attend school.
- Medical exemptions to immunizations must be reissued annually. The documentation must specify the immunization exempted, sufficient information to identify the medical contraindication to the specific immunization, and the length of time the immunization is medically contraindicated. The medical exemption form is available on the school website in the Health and Safety Department.
- The requirements for different grade levels for immunizations can be found on the NYS Department of Health Immunization chart on the school website in the Health and Safety Department.

Reminder to Parents: Schedule Summer Exams

Here are the mandated years for health exams and screenings:

- **Health examinations** will be required in grades pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11.
- **Vision screening and hearing screenings** will be required within 6 months of admission to school and in grades pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.
- **Scoliosis screening** will be required in grades 5 and 7 for girls and grade 9 for boys.

The physical exam must be completed on the approved NYS Education Department Student Health Examination Form by their primary care provider. This form can be downloaded from the Health and Safety Department on the school website at www.clake.org.

Please ask your health care provider to fax a copy of a current physical exam to (716) 753-2085. If we do not have a current physical on file for the required grade level or for sports participation, we will schedule your child for a physical with the school physician, Dr. Robert Berke or one of his associates during the school year. **If you do not want your child to receive their physical at school, please call the Health Office at (716) 753-5819.**

Summer Safety

The School Health Advisory Committee (SHAC) wants to remind you that **sunburned or tanned skin is damaged skin**. You can save the skin your child is in by protecting them with sunscreen every time they go out into the sun all year long. It is also important to **keep kids hydrated in the summer heat**. Water is the best fluid for hydration.

CL Participates in Civic Engagement

During the month of May, Chautauqua Lake Central Schools hosted a symposium to educate school communities about current crises and transformative civic reflection that can lead to healing. On May 13th, students and educators from Chautauqua Lake, Fredonia, Silver Creek, and Maple Grove heard from the Founding Chief Prosecutor for the UN Special Court for Sierra Leone, David Crane, and responded to his presentation. They asked insightful questions about the ongoing crisis in Ukraine and accountability for Vladimir Putin for crimes that violate international law. Following an interactive timeline and model diplomacy activity where students from different schools worked together to study the history of Ukraine, students heard from Founding Chief Prosecutor for the UN Special Court for Sierra Leone and the author of the book "Every Living thing: Facing Down Terrorists, Warlords, and Thugs in West Africa-A Story of Justice." Students gained further insight into the Ukraine Crisis from Ukrainian Aleksey Sergeevich as he shared not only his own experiences but that of his family who is still in Ukraine. Many of his family members have made their way to safety in Germany and are working on visas to come to the United States. Students wondering what they can possibly do about this situation heard suggestions from all speakers.

On May 24, 2022, Chautauqua Lake joined over 250 students from Chautauqua County attending a presentation by Carl Wilkens, the only American to remain in Rwanda during the 1994 genocide. Wilkens' presentation did not stop with Rwanda's tragic history but reflected the powerful and inspiring recovery process. Among the many lessons, he shared from his experience is the transformative belief that we don't have to be defined by what we lost or our worst choices. We can be defined by what we do with what remains - what we do next after tragedy strikes. Chautauqua Lake Social Studies teacher Leigh-Anne Hendrick organized these symposiums with her colleague, English teacher Emily Dorman. Hendrick and Dorman organized this collaboration with the Hebrew Congregation of Chautauqua's Holocaust and Social Justice Education program and area school districts to create these powerful conversations about learning to live together, and how we can demonstrate respect, empathy, and inclusion through civic engagement.
