A Message From Assistant Principal. Mr. Joe Steger

Our district sees goal setting and nurturing life-long learning practices as a priority for our students, but we also understand that as professionals, we must model those behaviors for our students. To do that, we have fashioned an innovative Professional Learning plan for all of our staff that involves individual goal setting and creating time to achieve those goals.

Each year, all of our staff are given the choice to identify two professional goals; these professional goals guide their professional learning throughout the year. Each staff goal aligns with district goals and building priorities.

With the CLCS professional learning plan, all staff are afforded professional development days to work on these goals. This professional development model has existed at CLCS for some time however, this year the team has added a new twist.

ANNUAL DIGITAL EQUITY FAMILY SURVEY

Starting in the 2021-2022 school year, the New York State Education Department is requiring all school districts in New York State to annually collect information from families about students' access to a device and the internet for the current school year. The survey must be sent out to families each fall so that data can be collected and sent to the NYS Education Department by the end of each January.

To make this annual process as easy as possible for families, Chautauqua Lake Central School District is using the same Google Form from the last school year so that families can quickly answer the questions for each child in their household. The survey applies to students in grades K to 12, if you have a Pre-K student attending CLCS you do NOT need to submit a survey for them. The online survey asks nine short questions (it takes a few minutes per child) about your family's digital access. Your answers will be used to help identify school and district needs, target resources and funding opportunities, and used to inform state policy and legislative initiatives.

The goal of the survey is to get as much participation as possible for our district so that the NYS Department of Education understands the need in our area for equitable access to the internet by all families. If you do not currently have internet access or are not able to complete the survey, please contact a school office; they can assist with either getting you a paper survey form or just asking you the nine questions over the phone so that your answers are counted.

Thank you for your cooperation and partnership in this new annual survey. We know this information will help support digital learning and access for all Chautauqua Lake Central School students and families.

CHROMEBOOK 1:1 UPDATE AND FAQ'S

Chautauqua Lake Central Schools (Elementary and Secondary) have been fully 1:1 in grades K to 12 since the 2020-2021 school year. The COVID closures required us to fast track our Chromebook rollout plan so that we finished earlier than expected. Fortunately, we had been rolling out Chromebooks each year prior to the COVID closures, so as a district, we were pretty close to being 1:1 in 2020.

Below is a review and FAQ that should be helpful to families to better understand the process at CLCS for 1:1 devices.

What does 1:1 mean?

It means that each student receives a Chromebook device to use for school work. Rather than checking out a device when needed or instead of going to a lab to use computers, the devices are being assigned to each individual student. Grades K to 6 leave the devices at school in charging carts, while grades 7-12 take the devices home each night.

When do students receive a device?

Each start of the school year provides grade K and grade 7 students with brand new devices. Kindergarten students use the same device until the end of grade 6, then are issued a new device upon entering into grade 7. Grade 7 students are assigned the same device until they graduate. New students to the district receive their Chromebook from the Information Technology department when they begin classes.

Does this mean everything is going electronic and all books and paper are going away?

No, this does not mean that everything is going electronic. We'll still have books, along with paper/pencil activities. Of course, as you would expect, each year we will see more and more resources becoming digital. Assigning a device to each student helps ensure that all students have access to the digital resources that are available.

Do families have to pay to use the Chromebook?

The school district pays for the purchase and upkeep of the Chromebooks, and families are not asked to contribute to the cost. If you choose to bring your own personal device to school, then the cost of that device and all repair/maintenance is your responsibility. The district is not permitted to work on any non-school owned devices.

What happens when my school Chromebook breaks or there's a problem?

Students should take the device to a classroom teacher, who will open a trouble ticket with the Information Technology department. Information Technology have spare Chromebooks available, so that students may use a spare device while their original device is being repaired in house or sent out for service.








HOOKED ON BOOKS

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CULTIVATING A "SCHOOLYARD HABITAT"

Chautauqua Lake Central School has become the first in Chautauqua County and has joined with over 5,000 schools nationwide that have transformed their schoolyards into thriving wildlife habitats that provide essential elements needed by all wildlife – natural food sources, clean water, cover and places to raise young. The habitat also serves as an outdoor education site where students can engage in cross-curricular learning in a hands-on way.

Working closely with Chautauqua Watershed Conservancy Conservationist, Carol Markham, Royal Fern Nursery and community members Jack and Diane Voelker, Chautauqua Lake has taken the first steps to pledge their commitment to provide a place outdoors to learn and connect with nature.



This is phase one in Chautauqua Lake Central School's commitment to sustainably and responsibly teach children about how to help the environment and communities around us. Students in grades Pre-K through 6 worked to establish food, water, cover and places to raise young for native flora and fauna. The garden holds sycamore trees, elderberry bushes, swamp and common milkweed, bluebird houses-built by students, and the students are currently solving how to keep water resources from freezing in the winter. They are learning about possible solar solutions and how to develop a setup that works for our space. Chautauqua Lake Central School campus sits on approximately 135 acres. Elementary Principal Megan Lundgren states, "It's been inspiring to see students take ownership over this process. By exploring the nature that surrounds us, students have learned how natural elements thrive and how they can positively influence the local habitat."



FIND YOUR TRAIL

A Message From Secondary School Principal Rachel Curtin From our Rails to Trails to the Westside Overland Trails, our County trail system with hundreds of miles of opportunities, is truly a treasure. Our students have given back to the community through service projects for kiosks and park clean up, and every grade level has enjoyed hikes in the community. We also want them to understand the beauty of these natural resources and find enjoyment in their state and county forests, parks, and trails through recreation activities such as snow shoeing, orienteering, cross country skiing, and mountain biking. Through federal grant support, our school now has a set of snowshoes, mountain bikes and MIPS helmets to give every student the opportunity to learn and enjoy trail biking and trekking. Our fat tire bikes are also equipped to ride on groomed snow. Student surveys showed that there is a strong interest in having more access to biking and enjoying the woods. Students were recently given an overview of the three essential elements for riding with safety and confidence from Mrs. Curtin. Mrs. Curtin is a level one mountain biking instructor through a national Bicycling Instructor Certification Program. We are also working with a local trail building organization and the Conservation program at Hewes Educational Center to upgrade the trails behind our school. We would like to offer family "slow roll" guided rides on the trails. We look forward to inspiring our youth and families to enjoy and understand their natural surroundings and to develop a love for physical activity that may benefit them for a lifetime.





The Human Anatomy and Physiology class had the unique opportunity to visit Gannon University's anatomy lab where they viewed cadavers and learned about several new innovations in the health career field. Real human dissections are becoming more rare in colleges across the country, but they still continue to offer the best preparation for anyone who will be working in the field of medicine. The trip culminated with a tour of the bioengineering lab, a phenomenal new innovation designed to vastly improve patient care.

Members of our junior class attended a guest lecture at the Jackson Center in Jamestown in celebration of the Constitution to commemorate the final signing of the constitution in Philadelphia. The title of their event was Plessy v. Ferguson; a moderated discussion featuring direct descendants of Plessy and Ferguson; Keith Plessy and Phoebe Ferguson. Their foundation is called Plessy and Ferguson based on their desire to create an intentional friendship and partnership in understanding the context and ramification of this supreme court case around racial segregation. They created this foundation and educational program to teach that mutual history can be a tool to create unity and understanding. Focused on juniors who are studying US History and this primary source experience enriched their academic understanding built off of previous learning with Mr. Rohlin who teaches about our local history in 8th grade.



What is justice? How do we get it? Students who are part of the 1st Amendment - 1st Vote cohort at CLCS traveled to Rochester to tour the Susan B. Anthony Museum & House and explored those questions in their And Justice For All? program.



Congratulations to Junior Lydia Kushmaul and Senior Alexandra Reyda, who are two of 62,000 students from across the country to earn academic honors from the College Board's National Recognition Program for rural/small town scholars. We encourage students to include this designation on college and scholarship applications and connect students with universities across the country, helping them stand out during the admissions process. They earned this recognition by excelling on their PSAT/NMSQT, PSAT 10, or AP Exams and in their classrooms. Students who may be eligible have a GPA of 3.5 or higher and have excelled on the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10, or earned a score of 3 or higher on two or more AP Exams; and/or attend school in a rural area or small town.

Lydia Kushmaul was also recognized for her musical accomplishments by NYSSMA, as she was selected for Area All-State Mixed Choir and as an alternate for women's chorus for Alto II at All-State.

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

A student's ability to learn and achieve and a school's ability to educate students are compromised by incidents of discrimination or harassment, including but not limited to bullying, taunting, and intimidation. Therefore, in accordance with the Dignity for All Students Act (DASA), the District strives to create an environment free of discrimination and harassment and to foster civility in the schools to prevent and prohibit conduct that is inconsistent with the District's educational mission.

The District condemns and prohibits all forms of discrimination and harassment of students based on actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender, or sex by school employees or students on school property and at school-sponsored activities and events that take place at locations off school property. In addition, any act of discrimination or harassment outside of school-sponsored events, which can reasonably be expected to materially and substantially disrupt the education process, may be subject to discipline.

Students or adults witnessing or in the knowledge of any act that could be considered harassing or intimidating to others are directed to report such incident in a timely fashion to an administrator or a DASA Coordinator for investigation.

The DASA Coordinator for grades K-6 is Kara Smith, 753-5846. The DASA Coordinator for grades 7-12 is school psychologist Katrina Cummings, 753-5849.

Annual training is provided for all District employees, and instruction from Kindergarten through grade 12 includes a component on civility, citizenship, and character education. Rules against discrimination and harassment are included in the Code of Conduct.

WHEN TO KEEP YOUR CHILD AT HOME NYS Department of Health Updated COVID Guidelines

Postive COVID Test

Students and staff who test positive may not come to school, and they must isolate for five days from the onset of symptoms.

Please call the Health Office at 716-753-5819 on the first day of school you know your child is positive. There is no temporary remote learning this year. All absences and illnesses should follow your child's absence procedures in your child's school handbook. Calling us will allow you to ask questions and clarify the dates for your child's return to school. A mask is recommended, but not required, in school for days 6-10.

When to Stay Home

Students or staff with the following symptoms, such as cough, fever (100 or higher), headache, sore throat, vomiting or diarrhea should stay home.

A child or staff member must be fever free for over 24 hours without the use of medication if they have a temperature of 100 or higher. Before returning to school, they must also have no vomiting or diarrhea for at least 24 hours.

Close Contacts

There is no quarantine for close contacts but masking is encouraged to keep others safe. We will also not call about or do contact tracing. If exposed to an infected person, students do not need to receive a COVID test.

We will not be testing students or staff at school.

If you or one of your children tests positive and you want to test other children in your household, contact the Health Office (716) 753-5819 for free test kits.

Feel free to also reach out if you have any questions or concerns.

IMPORTANT ALLERGY AND SAFETY REMINDERS

Parents have been notified that students in several classrooms have severe peanut/tree nut allergies. Strict avoidance of peanut/tree nut products is the only way to prevent a lifethreatening allergic reaction. We ask your assistance in providing these students with a safe learning environment. Teachers and administrators have also modified class materials to avoid the presence of any peanut/tree nut allergens used in cooking or for arts and crafts, science projects, or classroom parties and celebrations.

EMERGENCY CANCELLATIONS

School closings/cancellations (e.g., due to severe weather) will be announced on local radio and TV stations. When possible, a notice will also be posted on the district website, www.clake.org, and the CLCS Facebook page.

Parents and staff are reminded that SchoolMessenger is intended to be a courtesy call only, not the first line of communication to announce a closing.

IN CASE OF EMERGENCY AT CLCS

Parents can help Chautauqua Lake Central School prepare for an emergency by following a few simple steps:

- Know that the District is taking every step to keep your child safe.
- Keep your child's emergency information up-to-date.
- Wait to be contacted by the District at your emergency contact number.

The District has developed multiple methods of communicating with parents/ guardians. Please give our system an opportunity to work as planned. In case of emergency, please do not go to the scene or the school until you receive instructions.

- Keep the telephone lines open on your emergency contact numbers.
 Get accurate information and instructions.
- •Please do not call the school. Do not contact your child via cell phone. Phone lines must remain open.
- •Refrain from using social media to spread unofficial information.

CANCELLATIONS DUE TO WEATHER

The weather of Western New York can be very enjoyable. The changes from fall to winter to spring bring a rich set of experiences and opportunities for recreation. However, as we all know, winter also presents special challenges. Predicting the weather even a day in advance can be troublesome and erroneous at times.

We are all familiar and have learned to cope with the safety issues presented by wind, ice and snow. From time to time, it becomes necessary to cancel a day of school. Determining when this happens is never easy and involves a great deal of communication and deliberation. Below are some key aspects of the process used:

- Prior to the start of school, district officials monitor the weather forecast and the potential for adverse weather.
- At approximately 5:00 a.m., we begin to evaluate and discuss road conditions. Local highway authorities and law enforcement agencies are consulted to assist in determining safety concerns.
- Typically, neighboring school district superintendents and transportation supervisors are contacted to share their plans and local conditions, which may vary due to local geography.
- We will attempt no later than 6:45 a.m. to decide whether to offer district transportation and keep schools open. If the decision is to cancel school for the day, local radio and television stations are immediately contacted and use of the automated SchoolMessenger system is initiated.

A similar process is used for canceling after-school and evening activities. Generally, a decision for this type of cancellation takes place around 2 pm and applies to all after-school and evening activities. If the school day is not cancelled, we have the utmost confidence in our fine transportation staff and their ability to transport our students.

If a parent or guardian feels that weather conditions in their immediate area of the school district warrant keeping children at home, this is their decision. The decision concerning whether schools will be open or closed must be based on general district-wide conditions. Please trust that at all times district officials are concerned about making the most appropriate decision for our students. In all instances, we thank our parents for their support and understanding, our transportation staff for working to deliver our most precious cargo safely on a daily basis and our students for acting in a safe and responsible manner when being transported.

AVOIDING WINTER SLIPS & FALLS

Winter in Chautauqua County can often mean periods of icy or snowy weather. While the Buildings & Grounds Department works diligently to remove snow and ice from walkways and building entrances, you still may encounter slippery surfaces while walking around campus. The Chautauqua Lake Safety Committee offers the following tips for avoiding slips and falls during this winter season:

- Select appropriate footwear. Footwear with rubber or neoprene composite soles provides better traction on ice and snow than leather or plastic.
- Give yourself extra time for travel. Avoid rushing, taking shortcuts over snow piles, or traveling areas where snow or ice removal is incomplete.
- Be careful walking on slippery surfaces. It's best to avoid slippery surfaces, but if you have no choice, bend slightly forward and shorten your stride or shuffle your feet for better stability.
- Wipe your feet when entering a building. Remove moisture from the soles of your shoes on doormats to avoid walking on wet or slippery surfaces.
- Seek help if you fall and injure yourself. Immediately see the School Nurses and report your incident to the School Health Line, District, Secondary or Elementary Offices.

You are encouraged to report slippery conditions in the District's parking lots, walkways, and building entrances to the Buildings & Grounds Office at (716) 753-5825 or any school office.



Questions or concerns about a student's health or medical needs should be directed to a school nurse. The nurses can be reached in the Health Office at (716) 753-5819 from 7:30 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. each school day.

DRESS CHILDREN FOR COLD WEATHER

In anticipation of cold temperatures, please be sure that your child is dressed appropriately. Layering clothing is the best (coat, jacket, sweatshirt, or sweater), plus head and hand coverings. Please do not allow your child to leave the house with exposed skin (ears, hands, legs, etc.), as this increases the chance of frostbite in cold weather. If your child needs warm clothing (coats, hats, or mittens) and you cannot provide it, please call the school nurse at (716) 753-5819 for assistance.

Please understand that if you believe on a given day that conditions are too dangerous, you always have the final decision as to whether you send your child or not.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. Together we can ensure that all children arrive safely at school.

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
