This past year has been nothing short of extraordinary, marked by a multitude of noteworthy accomplishments. With great confidence, we can state that our district has made substantial improvements since the beginning of the school year.

Together, we have achieved significant advancements across various aspects of our school district. From our top academic performance rankings to facilities and grounds renovations, curriculum and instruction enhancements, and athletic accolades, our district has excelled in numerous areas.

Academically, we have raised the bar. Our students' proficiency ratings in 3-8 ELA and Math ranked at the very top of the region, showcasing their outstanding abilities. We have also attained top scores on Regents Exams, solidifying our position as the leading district in the region. Furthermore, our remarkable graduation rate of 98%—the highest in the area—stands as a testament to the quality education and top-notch instructional support our students receive.

Our commitment to providing an outstanding learning environment extended beyond the traditional classroom. The creation of a Mountain Bike Program has further enriched the educational experiences and recreational opportunities for our students. Moreover, our new Open Swim sessions for all CL & Ripley students and families have fostered a greater sense of community and wellness.

Significant improvements have also been made to our facilities and grounds. The installation of synthetic field turf enhances our athletic facilities, ensuring our students can play and train on a safe field late into the fall and start up again early in the spring. The grand opening of the Baker-Stuart Manufacturing Complex and aligned STEM academic tracks are unparalleled. We have also put in our new playground, renovated the Wrestling Room, reconstructed tennis courts, upgraded auditorium sound and lighting, and built the Chautauqua Lake Cafe.

Curriculum and instruction enhancements have also played a vital role in enriching our students' educational journeys. Our students now have the opportunity to earn the Advanced Manufacturing Credential, equipping them with valuable skills for their future careers. The introduction of the Seal of Civic Readiness Credential promotes civic engagement and responsible citizenship. The implementation of the Maple Syrup/Sapping Program and the addition of new courses such as Foundation of Education, Environment Sustainability, Technical Literacy, and JCC Chemistry have expanded the educational horizons for our students.

Athletic accomplishments have also been a source of pride for our district. Our Section VI Volleyball Championship victory, the NYS Wrestling Champion title earned by Jordan Joslyn, and the exceptional performance of our men's and women's Wrestling teams highlight the dedication and talent of our student-athletes. Track & Field achievements, including Jada Cole and Nick Jacobson's high jump performances at the State level, showcase their commitment and perseverance. Additionally, the scholarships awarded to Olivia Herrington (Canisius softball) and Alexandra McKee (Duquesne rowing) for their athletic achievements reflect our students' remarkable abilities.

As we conclude the school year, we celebrated an exceptional commencement ceremony honoring the Class of 2023. The graduation ceremony embodied tradition, with cherished elements like the parade through the village, personalized senior recognition statements and inspiring speeches by the salutatorian and valedictorian.

Our graduates have diverse aspirations including becoming teachers, social workers, veterinarians, nurses, accountants, chemical engineers, and business owners. Some are headed to higher education at institutions across the country, including Alfred, UB, Brockport, Canisius, Cornell, Duquesne, Edinboro, Fredonia, Grove City, JCC, Oberlin, Ohio Tech, and RIT. Moreover, we take pride in the fact that some of our seniors have chosen to serve their country by joining the Air Force, Marine Corps, and Navy. 

STATE MANDATED NICKNAME CHANGE

Dear Chautauqua Lake Community Members:

We would like to inform the community of actions that our district must take in light of the New York State Commissioner of Education recently issuing final regulations prohibiting school districts' use of Indigenous nicknames and images.

On Monday, June 5, 2023, we were informed by the New York State Education Department (NYSED) that we can no longer use the nickname "Thunderbirds" due to its Indigenous origins. The State's regulations will also require Chautauqua Lake to discontinue the use of any "Thunderbird" imagery and references for the same reason.

This notification from NYSED followed its May 18, 2023 release of written guidance interpreting the new regulations regarding the State's prohibition on school districts using Indigenous nicknames and images.

While we understand that there may be mixed feelings about being directed to change our school nickname, we want to emphasize that the district is required to do so by law and that we must meet these requirements.

To ensure compliance with State's regulations, the district is required to develop a plan to identify the physical locations where changes in nicknames and imagery must be made. The district has begun this process, as the attached plan outlines.

Additionally, the district believes that the cost of any State required changes will be paid for without taking funds from educational programs.

The Board of Education and the Leadership Team are committed to engaging in a collaborative process, which will certainly include the valued input of our school community, to create our new nickname.

While this change was not planned by the District, the Board of Education and the Leadership Team look forward to working with the school community to meet the State's requirements, and we are confident that we have the ability and resources to do so.

STATE MANDATED NICKNAME CHANGE

The plan below will assist Chautauqua Lake Central School District in transitioning from the "Thunderbird" and aligned imagery to a new nickname.

This transition will be done by utilizing two shared-decision making committees/teams (see below):

- The first team will be the CL Campus Committee. This CL Campus Committee is responsible for
 identifying all areas where the nickname and or coinciding imagery appears and the process in which
 these areas are removed and/or modified. This group is made up of representatives from our Buildings &
 Grounds staff, CL Clerk of the Works, CPL Architectural Firm, Leadership Team members, teacher(s),
 community representative and a board member(s).
- The second team will be the CL Design Committee. They are responsible for working with members of
 our professional learning community to identify and bring to the board approval for a new "nickname."
 This team will have members from our leadership team, CPL Architectural Firm, faculty, staff, students,
 board of education, parents and community members. It is noteworthy that some members of both
 team(s) may have dual roles within the district (ex. parent/teacher).

The following is a tentative timeline for the transition plan:

June-August 2023:

- CL Leadership Team will identify and select members for the CL Campus
 & CL Design Committees.
- CL Campus Committee will identify and create a prioritized list of areas that have the term "Thunderbird" depicted and aligned imagery.
- CL Campus Committee will work to devise strategies to remove and/or replace the "Thunderbird" name and imagery.

September-December 2023:

- · Creation of CL Design Committee.
- The Design Committee will develop strategies to gather feedback and ideas from various school community members.
- CL Design Committee will accumulate feedback from the school community, including students, parents, employees and board members to narrow down the list of possible nicknames.
- · CL Design Committee will devise a method by which a new nickname will be selected.
- CL Design Committee will recommend a new nickname to the BOE no later than December 31, 2023.

July 2023 - June, 2024

 The CL Campus Committee will use a prioritized list to begin to replace "Thunderbird" imagery and nickname by June 30, 2024.

July 2024-June, 2025

 Remove any remaining "Thunderbird" graphics and imagery and/or replace it with the new nickname by June 30, 2025.

Our goal is to choose a nickname that represents our school culture, community history and values. Your contribution matters, and we encourage you to take part in providing recommendations. Please share your nickname ideas and supporting rationale via email at nickname@clake.org by September 1st to ensure they are considered during the evaluation process. Thank you for your ongoing support and engagement. We look forward to receiving your creative ideas and building an even stronger community together!



Earlier this year, Mrs. Healy applied for packages of free seedlings through the 2023 school seedling program offered by the NYS department of environmental conservation. Seedling arrived on May 15th from Colonel William F. Fox Memorial Saratoga Tree Nursery. The Approximately 25 black chokeberry, silky boxwood, and ninebark shrubs were planted on the property along the front entrance treeline under the guidance of Mr. J. Angeletti,Mrs. Healy, Mrs. Spoon, and Mrs. Stroth. The location of each shrub was determined by considering the species growing requirements. The three species of shrub used provide a mixture of wildlife habitats, known to attract a variety of songbirds as well as a variety of other wildlife. The hope is to continue the planting of such local species on the grounds and to utilize the habitats for educational purposes throughout the district.

HEALTH NEWS AND INFORMATION



Summer Safety

The School Health Advisory Committee (SHAC) wants to remind you that sunburned or tanned skin is damaged skin. You can save the skin your child is in by protecting them with sunscreen every time they go out into the sun all year long. It is also important to keep kids hydrated in the summer heat. Water is the best fluid for hydration.

Immunizations

Immunization requirements for school attendance include:

- MMR/Varicella vaccines: Two doses of each are required for kindergarten students to attend school.
- Meningococcal vaccine: All students entering grades 7 and 12 must have the meningococcal vaccine to attend school.
- Tdap vaccine: Students entering grade 6 must receive the Tdap vaccine in order to attend school.
- Medical exemptions to immunizations must be reissued annually. The documentation must specify the immunization exempted, sufficient information to identify the medical contraindication to the specific immunization, and the length of time the immunization is medically contraindicated. The medical exemption form is available on the school website in the Health and Safety Department.
- The requirements for different grade levels for immunizations can be found on the NYS Department of Health Immunization chart on the school website in the Health and Safety Department.

Note: The best way to ensure your child is in compliance with the immunization requirements is to contact your child's health care provider prior to the start of school in September. Please ask your health care provider to fax your child's immunization record to the Health Office at (716) 753-2085. School nurses may not request these records from the doctor's office; the parent must initiate the request.

Notification letters were sent in June to parents of children not in compliance with the immunization requirements.



ParentSquare



Chautauqua Lake School District is moving to the ParentSquare communication system for the 2023-2024 school year

We are excited to let you know that we'll be combining the multiple systems that we use for communication into one communication system for Chautauqua Lake School District families. Currently the district utilizes ClassDojo at Elementary, Remind at Secondary and School Messenger is used district wide for various notifications. These services will come to an end starting June 30th, 2023. We started the rollout of ParentSquare in early June to allow enough time for parents to register, clean up contact information, etc. so the new system can be utilized over the summer of 2023.

ParentSquare will provide the same services as the other three systems but in one easy to use package to simplify communications with you pertaining to district, school and classroom events relevant to your child(ren). The system has other great features that the district will evaluate using over the summer of 2023. The main purpose of the new system is for parents and guardians to receive all relevant district, school and classroom communication via email, text, or the ParentSquare app.

If interested, ParentSquare provided a short overview video of the major system features geared toward parents. Since putting in links to a newsletter doesn't work so well if you go to YouTube on your device and search for the following:

Starting in June 2023, the district will be sending out invitations via email or text message to join ParentSquare. Please click the provided link to activate your account and confirm your contact information the school has in PowerSchool, it should only take a few minutes. You can use ParentSquare on any device, after registration you can download the free mobile app for iOS, Android or use the desktop version at www.parentsquare.com.

IMPORTANT NOTES:

- 1. During registration, if your contact information is not correct or recently changed and the school does not have the updated information please contact your school building office (Elementary or Secondary) and let them know what your updated cell phone number and email address are so the student information system can be updated.
- 2. If you do NOT receive the invitation email or text please contact your school office to ensure we have your current contact information (cell phone number and email address).

Our goal is for every family to join ParentSquare and engage with our school community by the end of summer 2023 so important back to school communications can be sent to all families. The invitation email or text will contain more information about available training resources (including a Getting Starting training video) if you would like to learn more about using and navigating this new system.

The Spring sports season faced an early challenge from mother nature, but our teams went out like lions! As the weather cleared, our spring teams established history in many ways. In track, 4 records were broken. The 4x100 relay team of Nick Jacobson, Cole Otto, Sully Ferrino, and David Speagle set the record time of 44.81.
