Big changes are coming to Chautauqua Lake Central School. After 16 years with the district, Superintendent Benjamin Spitzer has announced his retirement, effective June 30, 2020.

"I will miss working with the fantastic staff, students, parents, and Board members," says Mr. Spitzer. "I have enjoyed the challenge of developing and implementing the innovative ideas that have made Chautauqua Lake a destination district."

Dr. Joshua Liddell will take over as CLCS superintendent on July 1, 2020. He has worked in the district for more than 10 years, where he served as the Secondary School Principal and Supervisor of Athletic Programs.

"I am extremely proud and blessed to be selected as the next Chautauqua Lake Superintendent," said Dr. Liddell. "Mr. Spitzer has been an excellent mentor and together we have worked to ensure that the district is well-prepared for the upcoming leadership transition."

high school music in Jamestown, then
Silver Creek for 18 years..

Reopening Committee

Thautauqua Lake has established a committee to develop potential procedures and plans for the reopening of school this Fall. The CLCS Reopening Committee is made up of over 40 individuals with representation from key stakeholder groups such as teachers, administrators, parents, students, counselors, community members, support staff, coaches Board of Education members, buildings and grounds, transportation, cafeteria staff, local health care experts, and our school nurses. The committee also has CLCS staff members who are part of the Regional Reopening Sub-Committees to ensure we are receiving any applicable guidance put forth from our E2CCB region. Our committee is presently and proactively analyzing different reopening models and awaiting additional guidance from the state. The group's mission statement is:

"The Chautauqua Lake Reopening Committee will focus on the health, safety, and well-being of all our Pre-K-12 students and staff when making reopening decisions. We will work collaboratively to develop creative and effective solutions to ensure educational and social equity. Following NYS Education Department, NYS Department of Health, and federal CDC guidelines, we will produce the best and safest possible instructional environment we can with the tools and resources that are available."

The Reopening Committee will be staying abreast of any and all new information coming forth from New York State and will be continually meeting to develop a plan throughout the summer months. No Pesticides Requiring Advance Notification Used


hautaugua Lake Central School District practices Integrated Pest Management (IPM) as an effective and environmentally sensitive approach to pest management. IPM utilizes common sense practices to control pests by taking advantage of various pest management options including the judicious use of pesticides.

As part of its Integrated Pest Management program, the district may periodically use pesticide products requiring notification under State Education Law Section 409-h. This law requires that all employees and persons in parental relations to CLCS students be offered an opportunity to be informed of pesticide use and be sent summaries periodically throughout the school vear.

As this newsletter was sent to press, no pesticides requiring such notification had been used during the 2019-20 school year.

Reminder to Parents: Schedule Summer Exams

Health examinations must be completed on the approved NYS Education Department Student Health Examination Form. If you have already had a physical exam completed for the 2020-21 school year on a different form, the school will accept it.

The following are the mandated years for health exams and screenings:

- •Health examinations will be required in grades Pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11
- •Vision screening for distance and near vision acuity will be required within 6 months of admission to school and in grades Pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7 and 11
- •Hearing screening utilizing pure tone testing will be required within 6 months of admission to school and in grades Pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7 and 11
- •Scoliosis screening will be required in grades 5 and 7 for girls and grade 9 for boys

The NYS School Health Examination Form can be downloaded from the Health & Safety section on the district website at www.clake.org.

Please ask your health care provider to fax proof of a current physical exam to (716) 753-2085. If we do not have a current physical on file for the required grade level or for sports participation, during the school year we will schedule your child for a physical with the school physician, Dr. Robert Berke, or one of his associates. If you do not want your child to receive their physical at school, please call the Health Office at (716) 753-5819.
