

No Pesticides Requiring Advance Notification Used

Chautauqua Lake Central
School District practices
Integrated Pest Management
(IPM) as an effective and
environmentally sensitive
approach to pest management.
IPM utilizes common sense
practices to control pests by
taking advantage of various pest
management options, including
the judicious use of pesticides.

As part of its Integrated Pest Management program, the district may periodically use pesticide products requiring notification under State Education Law Section 409-h. This law requires that all employees and persons in parental relations to CLCS students be offered an opportunity to be informed of pesticide use and be sent summaries periodically throughout the school year.

As this newsletter was sent to press, no pesticides requiring such notification had been used during the 2020-21 school year. If you have questions about the IPM Program or pesticide use at Chautauqua Lake Central School, please contact the Director of Facilities at (716) 753-5825.



or this spring's community projects, our students rose to the occasion with two projects. For the first, dozens of students learning in-person and remote created videos for nursing home residents. Each student added their own message of love and positivity, and they shared the activities they enjoy doing. The videos were sent to local Heritage Ministries locations.

The residents, many of whom missed day-to-day interactions during the pandemic, loved watching the videos. The students involved also had fun making the videos, and their classmates benefitted by learning more about each other.

Along with the videos, each individual classroom discussed how they can do small acts of kindness and service

from home and make a big difference in their community. Each student took their ideas and added them to custom BINGO boards. Some ideas were big (adopt a pet or build a house for someone who is homeless) and some were small (give out a compliment or hold open a door) but each idea came from a genuine desire to be helpful.

The goal for the elementary school was to complete 500 mini service projects while out on spring break. At first, most classrooms thought this number was too big. When they learned there were 350 students, and that one small act of kindness would get the school halfway to our goal, it seemed to be very attainable. In the end, the students reported 721 acts of kindness and learned they have the potential to inspire more good in the world.


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Student Plays Featured in Film Festival












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Stronger Together

Envirothon Team Receives Commendation From Legislature

he Chautauqua County
Legislature recently presented
the CLCS Envirothon teams
with a formal commendation for
their performance in competitions
this spring. The students and their
coaches accepted the honor during
the Legislature's June virtual meeting.

Team 1's Amelia Brown, Alex Godfrey, Jackson Janicki, Corrine Kayes and Hannah Weise were recognized for winning first place in May's regional competition, with Team 2's Sydney Hawkins, Saige Keefe, Abbie Parker, Sophia Shearer and Jonas Simora finishing in second place. Both teams competed against schools from an area encompassing Western New York and the Finger Lakes.

After advancing to the state contest in late May, Team 1 went on to place in the top 10. In addition to winning eighth overall in the three-day competition, they also achieved the distinction of finishing second in the oral presentations.

"It is quite remarkable that the students scored that highly on their oral presentation," said David A. Spann, District Field Manager for the Chautauqua County Soil & Water Conservation District.

The Envirothon is a competition for high school students that promotes education in the field of conservation. Students must answer questions that test their knowledge of aquatic ecology, forestry, soils and land use, wildlife, and a current environmental issue. The issue chosen for this year's competition centered on the local management of water resources.

While usually hands-on and outdoors, the Envirothon experience had to be reworked this year due to the pandemic. Chautauqua County schools participated at a regional level instead of the county level, and all events were held virtually over Zoom. Despite the challenges presented by COVID-19, the coaches said the students studied hard and were well-prepared.

"At the county competition, they'll call it a sugar maple. But at that the state competition, it's *Acer saccharum*," according to Mr. Brian Fortney. "So you need to know the genus and species, not just the common name. It does push them a little further."

"They've been the best competition for each other," said Mrs. Mary Jantzi. "A lot of it is on their own time, and they've been dedicated to do that. You can count on any single of those kids on either team. If they tell you they're going to do something, they're going to do it far beyond your expectations."

While former students who previously competed in Envirothons have gone on to study conservation in college and pursue careers in the field, the teachers recognize there are other skills they take away from the program. "Self-motivation, knowing the world around you and teamwork," said Mrs. Jantzi. "They have to work as a team. Sometimes it goes your way, and other times it doesn't."



isney's "Descendants: The Musical," an adaption of the popular television movies, was presented this spring by Chautauqua Lake's Secondary School. In addition to an in-person performance for family and friends, the show was also streamed over the internet.

The musical follows the troublemaking offspring of Disney's most famous villains who are banished from the Kingdom of Auradon. The children spend their entire lives on the Isle of the Lost until the prince of Auradon offers them a chance at redemption by allowing them to attend his preparatory school.

One of the villainous parents, Maleficent, sees the invitation as an opportunity to leave the island and regain power. The four children have to decide whether they will go along with her scheme or learn to be good. "The kids have grown up with this expectation that they're evil," said Mrs. Jennifer Davis, the production's musical director. "But they realize they're not defined by what their parents are. They can make choices for themselves and be who they want to be. If that's different, that's okav."

"Descendants" features brand-new characters alongside classics such as Beauty and the Beast, Cruella de Vil and the Fairy Godmother. The show also has fun and catchy songs from the films, including "Rotten to the Core" and "Good Is the New Bad."

Last year's production wrapped up days before COVID-19 closed school buildings across New York State. For this year's musical, the cast and crew had to make changes due to the pandemic. In addition to social distancing on stage, the students also wore spacious singer's masks.

"There's a duty and desire to make it as safe as possible for the students while having the challenge of staying true to the art form," said Mrs.

Davis. "It helps us prioritize what's most important. We want to create something together. We want to share it with people. So, wearing a mask that keeps us safe and protects others is workable because there are other ways we can be expressive."



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Immunizations



Immunization requirements for school attendance include:

- MMR/Varicella vaccines: Two doses of each are required for kindergarten students to attend school.
- Meningococcal vaccine: All students entering grades 7 and 12 must have the meningococcal vaccine to attend school.
- **Tdap vaccine:** Students entering grade 6 must receive the Tdap vaccine in order to attend school.
- Medical exemptions to immunizations must be reissued annually. The documentation must specify the immunization exempted, sufficient information to identify the medical contraindication to the specific immunization, and the length of time the immunization is medically contraindicated. The medical exemption form is available on the school website in the Health and Safety Department.
- The requirements for different grade levels for immunizations can be found on the NYS Department of Health Immunization chart on the school website in the Health and Safety Department.

Note: The best way to ensure your child is in compliance with the immunization requirements is to **contact your child's health care provider** prior to the start of school in September.


Please ask your health care provider to fax your child's immunization record to the Health Office at (716) 753–2085. School nurses may not request these records from the doctor's office; the parent must initiate the request.

Notification letters were sent in June to parents of children not in compliance with the immunization requirements.

Reminder to Parents: Schedule Summer Exams

Here are the mandated years for health exams and screenings:

- Health examinations will be required in grades pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11.
- Vision screening and hearing screenings will be required within 6 months of admission to school and in grades pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.
- Scoliosis screening will be required in grades 5 and 7 for girls and grade 9 for boys.





Please ask your health care provider to fax a copy of a current physical exam to (716) 753-2085. If we do not have a current physical on file for the required grade level or for sports participation, we will schedule your child for a physical with the school physician, Dr. Robert Berke or one of his associates during the school year. If you do not want your child to receive their physical at school, please call the Health Office at (716) 753-5819.



The School Health Advisory Committee (SHAC) wants to remind you that sunburned or tanned skin is damaged skin. You can save the skin your child is in by protecting them with sunscreen every time they go out into the sun all year long. It is also important to keep kids hydrated in the summer heat. Water is the best fluid for hydration.

- Gavin Sauerland: Long jump and high jump




